6-12 months; must activate between October – March.	Fellowship Length	8-12 months; must activate between July-March. Start date can be deferred if there is visa difficulty.
Must possess a high level of language proficiency. Language reference required for each country of research.	Language Requirement	Language proficiency varies by country, but some ability is required for many countries.
Research project in field of economics, engineering, international development, mathematics, political science, public health, science, comparative or international education, or technology. Applicants propose budget, specific to project, city, and research needs. Covers expenses for travel, living, research, insurance, dependents (but not travel for dependents).	Amount	Monthly budget varies by country; each determines fixed monthly support. Covers expenses for travel, living, research, insurance, dependents, and tuition/study (if applicable).
Applications are submitted to U.S. Department of Education using Online G5 e-Application System. Project Director submits Ohio State application package to U.S. Department of Education.	Application Process	Applications open mid-March on Embark Fulbright Online Application at us.fulbrightonline.org . Student completes final submission of all materials; Graduate School adds evaluation form.
Internal Ohio State deadline — usually 2 weeks prior to the official Department of Education deadline. Applicants should contact Ohio State Project Director well in advance of the institutional deadline.	Deadline	Mid-Sept: Graduate School's deadline for submission of electronic application and materials. late Sept/early Oct: on-campus interviews. Mid-Oct: Fulbright final application submission.
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
